

Robert P. George is
McCormick Professor of
Jurisprudence and Director
of the James Madison
Program in American Ideals
and Institutions at
Princeton University. He
has also taught at Harvard
Law School. He has served
as Chairman of the U.S.
Commission on
International Religious

Freedom and as a presidential appointee to the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. He has also served on the U.S. President's Council on Bioethics and as the U.S. member of UNESCO's World Commission on the Ethics of Science and Technology. He was a Judicial Fellow at the Supreme Court of the United States, where he received the Justice Tom C. Clark Award. A Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Swarthmore College, he holds the degrees of JD and MTS from Harvard University and the degrees of DPhil, BCL, DCL, and DLitt from Oxford University, in addition to twentythree honorary degrees. He is a recipient of the U.S. Presidential Citizens Medal, the Honorific Medal for the Defense of Human Rights of the Republic of Poland, and a Barry Prize for Distinguished Scholarly Achievement of the American Academy of Sciences and Letters, among many other awards, He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and Of Counsel to the law firm of Robinson & McElwee.

Cornel West

Cornel West the Dietrich Bonhoeffer Professor of Philosophy and Christian Practice at Union Theological Seminary. He is also Class of 1943 Professor of African American Studies Emeritus at Princeton University. He is a magna cum laude graduate of Harvard College and



obtained his MA and PhD in philosophy at Princeton. Professor West is best known for his classics Race Matters and Democracy Matters. His memoir is entitled Brother West: Living and Loving Out Loud. He made his film debut in the Matrix—and was the commentator (with Ken Wilbur) on the official trilogy released in 2004. He has made several spoken word albums including Never Forget, collaborating with Prince, Jill Scott, Andre 3000, Bootsy Collins, and others. In 2021, he won a Grammy Award along with Arturo O'Farrill for the year's best Latin Jazz Album. Professor West has a passion to communicate to keep alive the legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr.—a legacy of telling the truth and bearing witness to love and justice. Recently, Professor West received the high honor of being invited to give the famed Gifford Lectures in Scotland, known as "the Nobel Prize of philosophical lectures."
